

Exercise 5: Statutory Citations
(due November 4, 2008)

Look up each of the following statutes in order to find any missing citation information, then construct a complete citation to the statute in ALWD form. For Illinois statutes, cite to the print edition of Illinois Compiled Statutes; you may substitute “ILCS” for “Ill. Comp. Stat.” if you wish. For federal statutes, cite to the official edition of the United States Code. You may use Lexis or Westlaw to look up the statutes initially, but you will probably need to consult the printed versions to verify the dates and editions to include in the citations. If the current version of a statute does not appear in a print source, you may cite to an online database instead.

1. Subsection (c) of section 20 of the Environmental Protection Act, an Illinois statute enacted in 1970. Section 20 has been amended several times, most recently in 1993. Include the name of the act in the citation, as permitted by ALWD Rule 14.2(g).
2. The Economic Espionage Act of 1996, a federal statute that appears in title 18 of the United States Code. Cite to subdivision (a) of the first section of the act, and include the name of the act in the citation.

3. Section 6(a) of the Controlling the Assault of Non-Solicited Pornography and Marketing (CAN-SPAM) Act of 2003, codified at 15 U.S.C. § 7705(a).
4. Section 4b of the Child Passenger Protection Act, added by the Illinois General Assembly in 1997 and amended on various occasions since then.
